Saint of the Day: St. Prisca of Rome



Also known as St. Priscilla, Prisca was a child martyr of the early Church. She was born to Christian parents of a noble family in Rome during the reign of Emperor Claudius II, in the first century. While Claudius did not persecute those who believed in Christ with the same fervor as other Roman emperors,

Christians still did not practice their faith openly. In fact, Prisca's parents went to great lengths to conceal their faith, and thus they were not suspected of being Christians.

However, at age thirteen, Prisca was accused of Christianity, and was eventually arrested and brought before the Emperor. Despite her youth, Prisca courageously proclaimed and upheld her Catholic Faith, even though she knew that doing so was ultimately the pronouncement of her own death sentence.

She suffered imprisonment and terrible tortures to maker her denounce Christ. When all efforts to change her mind failed, she was taken to the coliseum to be devoured by lions. Rather than attack her, however, the lions are said to have licked her feet! Finally, Prisca was taken outside the city walls and beheaded. Legend tells us that when she was martyred, a great eagle appeared above her and protected her body for several days until the Christians were able to retrieve it. The young martyr was buried in the Catacomb of St. Priscilla - named after the wife of a Roman senator, also a martyr, who shares the same feast day of January 18. As an interesting fact, there is speculation that this St. Priscilla was a family relation of the childmartyr St. Prisca.
