Feast Day: Saint Lucy



Saint Lucy was a young virgin martyr in Syracuse, Sicily, during persecution. According to legends, Lucy consecrated herself to Christ and to serving the poor. She delivered wheat and bread to the poor and homebound, and possibly to Christians staying in the catacombs, often in the darkness of night. For light, she would carry a lamp, or wear a crown of candles to free her hands. Her Christian charity angered the pagan to whom she was betrothed. He turned her over to the authorities, who then attempted first to drag her away and humiliate her in public. They were unable to physically move her. Then, they tried to burn her, but failed. They ended her life in the year 304 with a dagger to her throat. St. Lucy's legend holds that during torture, her eyes were gauged out and God then provided her with new eyes. She is often depicted holding a small plate with two eyes on it. She is the patron saint of the blind and those with eye problems.

Saint Lucy, you did not hide your light under a basket, but let it shine for the whole world, for all the centuries to see. We may not suffer torture in our lives the way you did, but we are still called to let the light of our Christianity illumine our daily lives.
